Victoria's design scene: An inside look

I am often asked: What do you think about the "design scene" in Victoria? Who are the best designers in Victoria? Is Victoria a good market to work in? Is there much competition in Victoria?

The design scene in Victoria has changed drastically since I began Meade Design Group in 2002. When I started my firm, I kept hearing the same five names over and over again, but, as time has passed and I have become more part of the design community, the list has grown. And this makes sense. Victoria is evolving into a sophisticated and cosmopolitan city considering its relatively small size. What other city our size has such fantastic opera, ballet,

theatres, museums, and art galleries? Victoria even has commercial districts with distinctive style and purpose like Antique Row, Lo Jo, and the Design District.

I also see Victoria's design clients becoming savvier and more design conscious. They have access to many of the resources that we designers have to inspire us and keep us up to date on new methods and materials — the internet, television, magazines, and, of course, local design shops. Designers have had to raise their game and evolve to stay on top. However, informed clients are also better clients: they push their designers to imagine outside of the box and to introduce new concepts that keep the trends moving.

Victoria clients may have gained some skills in figuring out what they want their homes to look like, but designers are still needed to make it happen. The creative process of finding the right solution for a room, producing the best floor plan, sourcing complementary fabrics, creating a focal point that will make a room memorable, or even just finding the right piece of furniture or accessory in Victoria are all things that designers do.

I think what is critical to a designer's success in Victoria is not just being fantastically creative or gifted — although those attributes are important — it is also to

have great resources, team members, and trades people. A good designer is organized and can take a project from concept to completion, while keeping their client happy and producing a space that will become the next show piece to inspire more people to line up outside their door.

Designers of Distinction

In Victoria, we have an impressive community of interior designers, many of whom have been recognized for their work. Kimberly Williams and Robyn Meredith Bryson have both been featured in *Architectural Digest*, one of the top achievements for a designer. Bruce Wilkin and Bruce Wilson made the top 100 list of the best

designers by Canadian House and Home, as well as having their projects featured regularly in the magazine. Meade Design Group was fortunate to have one of its projects appear on HGTV's Top Ten as the sixth best games room on the continent for our project in Maple Bay; Robyn Meredith Bryson will be in a future episode of the same show for the award-winning home, The Radius Residence. Sandy Nygaard, J.C. Scott, and Teresa Ryback have all been featured in Spectacular Homes of Western Canada by Panache. Amie de Toro is a new Victoria addition with amazing international exposure — her work and home accessory line have been published in Elle Decor, House Beautiful, Metropolitan Home, and many more — and she is part of the wave of designers new in town.

A decade ago, the sophisticated residents of Victoria had few options when looking for a designer. Now there is a wealth of options. The designers of Victoria are not just talented individuals — they are a diverse community that shares the goals of making this city a better place — even if it is just one room at a time.

Who are the new kids on the block — the ones to watch? The new generation of designers in Victoria is energetic. They are not just stylish they embrace technology and are savvy in social marketing tools like blogs, Facebook, Twitter, Technorati, all of which are becoming important parts of their business lexicon. Names like Lana Lounsbury, Tonia Di Introno, Leah Rourke, Jenny Martin, Heather Draper, Ben Brannen, Acacia Interior Design, Danisha Rice, Amanda Forrest, and many others.





Amie de Toro Indulging in colour

Amie de Toro lived and worked in Madrid, London, New York, and Buenos Aires before opening her own interior design firm in Victoria. Hers is an eclectic, travelled background amply illustrated in a professional style that identifies the varied nuance of cultural diversity but achieves a shared quality of the eclectic: a lasting, classic look.

Her designs — interiors for upscale residences and commercial properties, as well as a stunning line of home accessories — have been featured in *Elle Décor, House and Garden*, and *Metropolitan Home*.

Her Peruvian upbringing emphasized a vibrancy and boldness of colour, which is something she'd like to see more of — in abundance. "I believe we should all indulge in colour and stay away from being shy when using it."

A family trip to Venezuela, when de Toro was five years old, got her thinking about designing her own world. "I remember the moment I set my eyes on the city, I became absolutely captivated by the sight of houses and buildings that seemed to be suspended on mountains of exuberant tropical vegetation."

That started her drawing her own creations and, perhaps, laid an early foundation for a design preference that favoured simple forms yet engaged a temperamental spirit.



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
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
One of Victoria's most sought-after interior designers for the past 15 years, Sandy Nygaard's work is amply displayed in the interiors of award-winning signature private homes, upscale salons like Carreiro The Studio, iconic Victoria businesses like Rogers' Chocolates, and sophisticated residential developments like the Leiser Building restoration, The Gateway, Tuscany Village, and, of course, the elegant Brentwood Bay Lodge and Spa.

Nygaard Interior Design's work was recently featured in a four-page spread in the book Spectacular Homes of Western Canada by Panache. Another of her homes won multiple industry honours, including the CARE and SAM awards last year.

"New ideas make me passionate and putting it all together — it's a puzzle all the time so it's lots of fun."








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




Designing a modern home for a young family has given the world quite a window into the work of Robyn Meredith Bryson. Comprised of expanses of glass, her design looks upon Gonzales Bay and has drawn admiring attention from local passersby to international media and was featured in Architectural Digest in May 2009. "The Radius Residence gave me the opportunity to help this young couple marry their vision with function, while navigating the limitations of their building site." Understanding the local landscape is something that comes naturally to Bryson: she has been practising as a designer in Victoria for 35 years. In the mid-1970s, she had quite a progressive vision for the time, "I wanted to work as a design consultant from Victoria, making interior design accessible to more people."

Bryson credits her aesthetic and approach to her craft to her earlier schooling at the Vancouver School of Art and her experience working in house for a developer where she worked on an array of commercial and residential projects. She is passionate about her work, espousing a "less is more" approach to her designs.

Bryson is excited about the new materials that are being created today. "There is so much happening around the globe: people are harnessing technology and this is leading to innovative materials that are allowing designers to have greater scope in what they can create." For Bryson, design is all about people: "From the distributors to the subtrades to the clients, you get this collective creative energy from a team, and the results are brilliant."



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

The design firm especially loves working on smaller resorts and that translates into residential design. "Clients ask us to recreate a feeling that they experienced at one of our resorts. We get a sense of what the client wants, and then we help them create a real space that will work for them."

tailored home comforts

t began as a simple request to replace a set of counter stools that were uncomfortable and snowballed into a complete home overhaul. The relatively new home that my client Jane purchased just months earlier seemed perfect at the time – but we learned that you can improve on perfection.





Now normally, a counter stool can simply be replaced with another option, but when they are bolted to a concrete floor it proves to be tricky. After various samples and attempts, we created the perfect floor by skim coating over the original (hiding the bolt marks) with a mix of white concrete and a hint of umber pigment, and finishing with a beautiful gloss.

The new stools are so comfortable and very elegant with their dark stained wood bases and recycled white pearl leather

seats. Of course they look even better with the custom loveseat, pair of chairs, ottoman cubes, new carpet, dining table, chairs, console cabinet, white concrete countertops, microedge stainless steel sinks, limestone backsplash, paint, wallpaper, etc... And that was just the family room!

While Bruce Wilson is a self-professed "architecture school dropout," he's gone on to build a profound body of work that touches on a variety of design disciplines. He landed in Victoria by chance and established his eponymous firm in 1992, designing everything from furniture and exhibits to interior spaces.
