



arbara Gergel is one of those designers with a knack for finding charm in the most unprepossessing places. When she and her family decided to move to Victoria from Maple Bay in 2003, she found herself drawn to her upholsterer's Tudor-style cottage on a Fairfield corner property. In one of those moments of pure serendipity, the cottage turned out to be for sale.

Built circa 1925 for a Hudson's Bay buyer, the unpretentious cottage was full of soul. Despite small rooms and other eccentricities, Gergel instantly saw the potential and the quirky charm of an English cottage colliding with Victoria cool.

"This is the kind of house with a lot of original details ...," she says, "so you can

mend things rather than renovate, and remain true to its idiosyncrasies." She took her time understanding the house's needs, and always had two questions in mind: what do I gain and what do I lose?


The Italian word *sprezzatura* —to make whatever one does appear effortless, without too much fuss or thought — perfectly describes what Gergel has achieved. But behind the illusion of effortlessness was hard work. She wanted all the elements in her house to tell a story and have meaning. Her vintage treasures — including a 300-pound outdoor sink she got from a salvage yard and repainted in satin black — are a narrative of their previous owners' history, travels, talents, and tastes. They coexist

with works of Gergel's own design, such as the luxurious window treatments in thick botanical linen prints and silk check patterns, and the seamless improvements throughout the house.

The home reflects a journey of collecting, not an attempt at a particular style, says Gergel. To pull off this eclectic look, objects and furnishings set near each other should have a decade between them. So, don't put a 1970s sofa next to a 1980s chair. Achieve balance by skipping a decade either way.

"The house gave me a new appreciation of the things I owned," says Gergel, "and it's still evolving. In some ways it's like taking an old mink coat and making it work as a blanket — it just gets better."
